#### **Accounting Policies**

The accounts are prepared on a receipts and payments basis with a statement of assets and liabilities.

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund representing unrestricted income that is expendable, at the discretion of the committee, in the furtherance of the objects of the charity. Reserves are held against losses incurred from time to time in performing large scale concerts.

### **Governing Document and appointment of Trustees**

The charity is governed by constitution. Trustees are elected by members at the Annual General Meeting each September.

#### Objects and achievements

The object of the charity is to promote public education in and appreciation of choral music by the presentation of public choral concerts and associated events.

During the year ended 31st July 2018, we have performed four concerts under the baton of our Musical Director, Andrew O'Brien.

In November, we performed Bach's Christmas Oratorio in Royston; in December our Christmas concert was, again, in Royston. In March we performed Faure's Requiem along with motets by Durufle and Bruckner in Standon and in June we sang Rutter's A Sprig of Thyme and Vaughan Williams' Serenade to Music in Barkway.

Our membership this year has averaged 68, (2017: 71).

The average attendance at our concerts was 126 (2017: 119).

Our financial position at the end of the year is sound.

Our accounts are prepared on a receipts and payments basis.

This means that some of the income relating to this finiancial year (noteably the gift aid tax reclaim) will appear in next year's accounts, and when we buy music for our library, that cost will be written off completely in the year of purchase, rather than depreciated over several years.

The amounts due at the end of the financial year are shown on the statement of assets and liabilities. In the year to 31st July 2018, we received £3,034 more than we spent. This is due in no small part to our success in obtaining significant grant funding for our November concert, and we are grateful for the support of the granting bodies concerned.

At 31st July, our reserves, represented by our bank account balances, total £18,714.

# Independent Examiner's Report to the members of Royston Choral Society Charity no 1090459

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31st July 2018, set out on pages 1 to 5.

### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Act").

The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Act and that an independent examination is needed.
