## Notes from the Musical Director

My first encounter with the B minor mass at the tender age of 18 and a memory I cherish. I was invited to join the Rodolphus Choir after spending two years working with Ralph Allwood in the National Youth Choir of Wales. We rehearsed the work for a week and then performed it with the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment and an incredible team of soloists which included Emma Kirkby, James Bowman, John Mark Ainsley and Michael George. Many of the choir went on to become an important part of my musical journey and some went on to become stars (the tenor next to me was Eddie Redmayne). It was one of my first encounters with Bach's larger choral works and a concert I remember very well.


Six months later I ended up conducting the work (and Carmina the following week!) as part of the university 'Millenium Festival'. It was my first real experience conducting a large choral work, and I was blown away by the sheer complexity and brilliance of the work. It was hard work, but the effort was worth it and the experience deeply satisfying. The B Minor Mass had not been performed for sometime in Norwich so there was a general excitement about joining the choir and orchestra for the concert. We had six rehearsals then a rehearsal on the day. It went remarkably well, and it was performed to a packed church.



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Since then, I have performed it many times as a soloist but also with a consort group at the Snape Maltings (16 voices) conducted by Suzuki from memory! It is a difficult work but a work that is worth the journey. Everytime I return to the work, it moves deeper into my soul. I really believe that Bach wrote this piece for himself composing it out of love for the divine. It is certainly a pillar in the Western Classical tradition but also a canvas onto which Bach poured his compositional genius. It does not have the narrative of the passions or cantatas, but its emotional palate is vast and ever changing through the work. Over the next few months, I would recommend you listen to the piece as well as maybe watch one of the performances on Youtube. I am excited about rehearsing this work so here's to a wonderful new term!

#### Subscriptions

The subscription for the 2023/24 season will be £160 for the year. The easiest way to pay that is online; the bank details are:

Alternatively, you can bring cash or a cheque to the first rehearsal. That week is quite busy with music etc, so if it's cash, it's helpful if you put it in an envelope with your name on it, please.

If you'd rather pay by the term, the rates will be £65 for the first two terms you attend, and, if you're with us for a third term in the same season, you get a discount and it's £40 for that one.

If this subscription is difficult for you, please remember that you can speak to me confidentially and we will work something out. We all have periods when things are tight, and some of us have more challenging financial circumstances than others. We turn no-one away from choir on the grounds of affordability.

#### Why tenors like singing with the Royston Choral Society


For James B, it's the sum total of our individual input "the opportunity to be part of something larger than myself working together to make a great sound." He also appreciates the inclusivity of the choir "It provides an opportunity for people of different ages, abilities, backgrounds and musical experiences to get together to perform great works to a high standard in a friendly environment."

The power of the performance is also an attraction for our other James B "I like working on something that challenges both individually and collectively. This culminating in a concert with a sense of occasion and hopefully giving those moments of beauty and joy whilst getting it absolutely right. The whole room can feel it and so will you."

Alan B praises the quality of leadership in our musical director, Andrew O'Brien. "Andrew is an excellent choral trainer and it is in fact a privilege to sing under his leadership. Over a period of 55 years I have sung in a number of choirs including the BBC Choral Society and I can only think of two other conductors as stimulating, and one of those was Malcolm Sargent in the early 1960s."

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
#### RCS Bass Part Rep - Anthony Pigg (email partrep.bass@roystonchoralsoc.org.uk) writes:

The Bass Section has had another good year and our numbers have increased. The recent average attendance has been around 14, there were 13 participants in the spring concert and 16 in the summer, which if not the highest ever is certainly the highest for some time.

We were delighted to be part of the performance of the Durufle Requiem and Parry's Songs of Farewell, last November at Standon church and enjoyed working for that concert. Then the Christmas concert which is always a special occasion and made even more so this year not only by the return to St. Johns, which we always consider home, but also by the inclusion of Ralph Vaughn Williams's Ceremony of Carols with one of our number singing the solo part.

Personally, I think that the spring concert, Hydn's Creation, was the highlight of the year. It is such a wonderful piece to sing and reasonably accessible. Some of the bass section found the summer concert rather demanding, firstly, because the pieces were split into two parts (Bass 1 and Bass 2) and with hindsight perhaps we should have taken a little more care dividing the section into two (our thanks to the members who changed at the last minute and made the balance work so well) and secondly, the spirituals, though lovely to hear, were for some of us an unfamiliar idiom, however, it is at times like that when one can learn so much!

The members of the bass section welcome this term's return to the Bach B Minor mass. We worked on it in 2020 but the pandemic got in the way and although we had studied it we never got to perform it. We are really pleased that it is back this term and are looking forward to finding out what we can remember. We eagerly await the restart of rehearsals then the concert in November and indeed all the academic year ahead at Royston Choral Society. Our thanks to Andrew and Michael for their guidance.



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## Can you help?



Listed here are a couple of initiatives which the committee has discussed and think could benefit the society. ## Friends of Royston Choral Society

We have a number of loyal audience members who come to most, if not all of our concerts. The idea behind establishing something like a Friends group is to make them feel appreciated and for us to hopefully perhaps get even more out of them.

Some thoughts the committee has had are to perhaps let them buy 'season tickets'. So a ticket per concert but perhaps with a small reduction. We need to be careful that we don't in effect lose (too much) money here though, so another alternative, rather than reducing the price, might be to offer them a drinks reception before a couple of the concerts where they perhaps get a chance to mingle with Andrew and perhaps the soloists. Or maybe they get invited to a rehearsal?

I think there are lots of possibilities but is there someone that would take this on as a project and come up with a solid proposal we could implement before the end of this season?


## Orchestral Player Sponsorship Programme

The idea behind this initiative is to persuade individuals, groups of people or businesses to help fund our bigger concerts by 'Sponsoring' an orchestral player. The precise details need to be worked out and for individuals there is almost certainly scope for sponsorship to qualify for additional money through gift aid.

It is probably one of those things that we won't know whether it will work unless we try it but I do know of one choral society that runs this guite successfully. In the end it was the initiative that allowed them to regularly have two concerts with an orchestra in a season. Could you be the person who could make this work for us?

#### Stage Manager

We are really fortunate that there is a regular band of helpers that turn up early on concerts and stay late collecting staging, building it, tearing it down and returning it. However, the organisation of what we need, how we arrange it etc is currently shared between Heather and Huw. Those of you who have sung with the society for a while will remember Peter Murray used to do this job extremely effectively. It would really help, moving forward, if there was a dedicated person who again would do this. Because of our larger numbers we need someone to think about how we could extend our current staging to get more of us on it. We also are way overdue getting Andrew a better 'podium'. There really is a limit as to how long the current Heath-Robinson box, propped up on an odd assortment of blocks of wood from my shed will last! Is this something you could take on?



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#### Librarian


For too long Caroline has been doing double duty as both treasurer and librarian. It is not fair that we keep abusing her good nature in this way and given her professional skills as an accountant it is very important to us that we keep her in the treasurer role.

We therefore must find someone to take her place as librarian. The job is not consistently onerous, instead peaking around the early weeks of each term and just after concerts.
